SPANISH 2 MCR (MEETS COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS) (UC, CSU)

Grades: 9,10,11,12 - Year

Prerequisite: Spanish 1 with a grade of “C” or better or teacher approval

This class is structured for non-native Spanish speakers. Students will develop basic proficiency skills in the areas of reading, writing, listening and speaking in a culturally authentic context. This is a continuation of the beginning level course. Students will further improve their conversation skills using a 1,000-1,200-word vocabulary and appropriate conversation level grammatical patterns. The study of Hispanic culture will be integrated into the curriculum, providing the student a better understanding of the daily use of the language. This course is designed to meet the high school graduation requirement and is meant for students who plan to attend college with a major not requiring advanced study of Spanish.

Our admission guidelines are designed to ensure you are well-prepared to succeed at UC.

If you're interested in entering the University of California as a freshman, you'll have to satisfy these requirements:

- > Complete a minimum of 15 college-preparatory courses ([a-g courses](#)), with at least 11 finished prior to the beginning of your senior year.

The 15 courses are:

*or equivalent to the 2nd level of high school instruction

- > Earn a grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or better (3.4 if you're a nonresident) in these courses with no grade lower than a C.

HIGH SCHOOL SUBJECT REQUIREMENTS

The CSU requires a minimum 15-unit pattern of courses for admission as a first-time freshman. Each unit is equal to a year of study in a subject area. A grade of C or better is required for each course you use to meet any subject requirement.

Area	Subject	Years
a.	History and Social Science (including 1 year of U.S. history or 1 semester of U.S. history and 1 semester of civics or American government AND 1 year of social science)	2
b.	English (4 years of college preparatory English composition and literature)	4
c.	Math (4 years recommended) including Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, or higher mathematics (take one each year)	3
d.	Laboratory Science (including 1 biological science and 1 physical science)	2
e.	Language Other than English (2 years of the same language; American Sign Language is applicable - <u>See below about a possible waiver of this requirement</u>)	2
f.	Visual and Performing Arts (dance, drama or theater, music, or visual art)	1
g.	College Preparatory Elective (additional year chosen from the <u>University of California "a-g" list</u>)	1

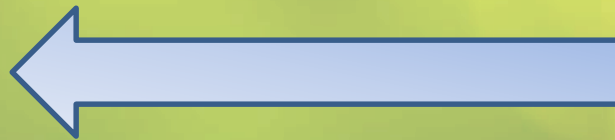

- Activities will be communicative in nature, promoting the use of the Spanish language in real life situations and through creative play.



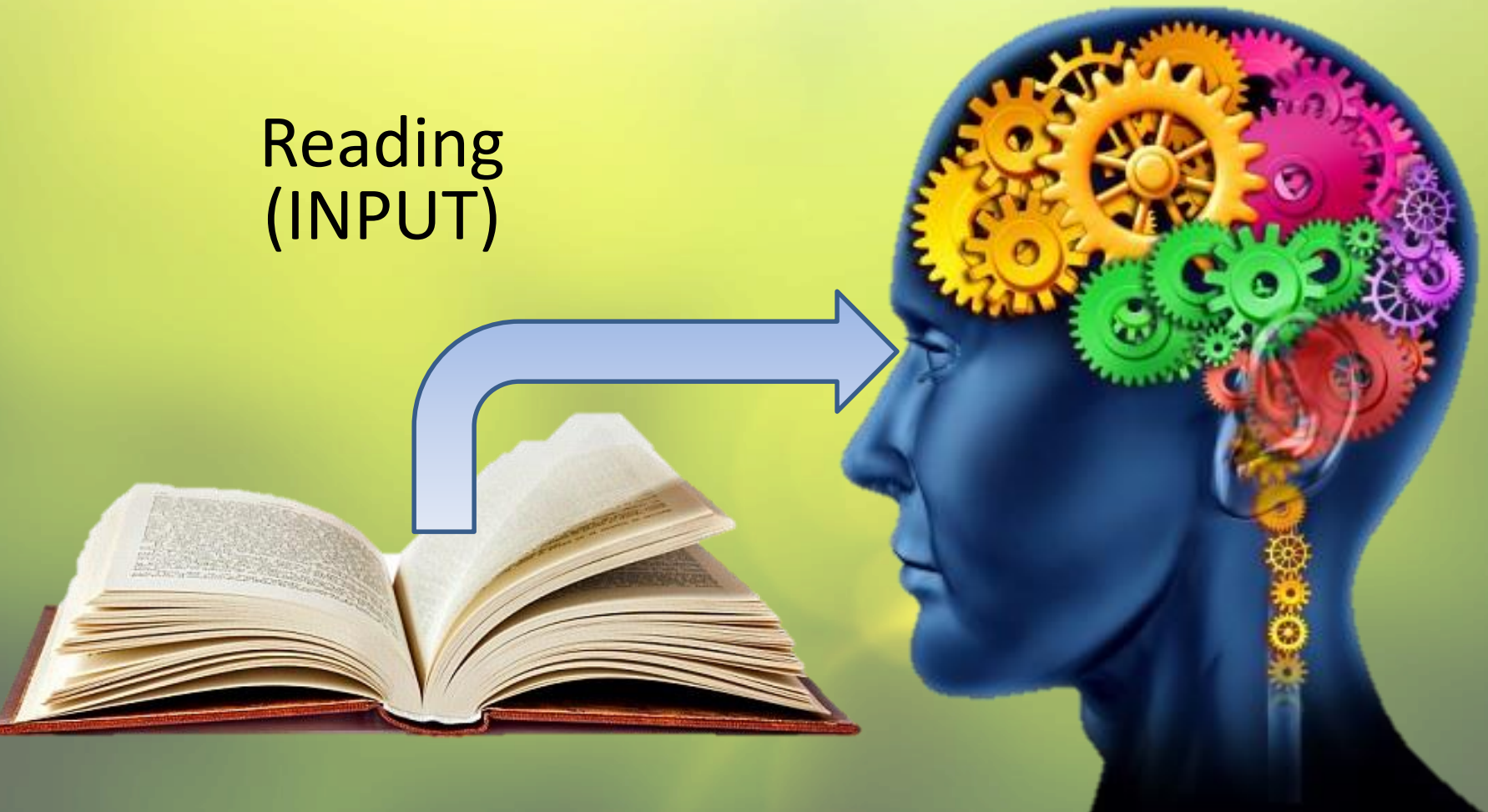
Spanish 2 MCR

You probably think you can multitask; maybe you talk on the phone while you do your homework, or text while you drive (please don't!!!). Scientific studies have shown that multitasking is not actually possible. What actually happens is that we switch our attention rapidly between those tasks, and we miss what happens in the milliseconds in between. If you're reading a book and listening to music, that's okay. Driving and texting though? That is as dangerous as driving drunk, say most experts.

The bottom line is that the experts are now in agreement that multitasking doesn't really work. *So what should you do?*

Try focusing on one thing for about 15 - 30 minutes, then giving yourself a short break, a reward, or switching to another task. Even moving to another location 2 - 3 times an hour will help you get more done and stay focused.

Adding some music (especially music with little or no lyrics) can also be helpful to set a mood
